OUR CAMPUS

We enjoy a beautiful, 26-acre campus in Vacaville, CA. Our facilities include a well-equipped library, a band rehearsal room with three practice studios, art room, vocal music room, computer lab, and a fully staffed kitchen for our lunch program. We have two well-maintained playgrounds and Extended Care garden area.

OUR FACULTY

Our faculty is comprised of highly qualified and dedicated Christian educators who are committed to VCS's written philosophy, mission, vision, and core values. They engage in ongoing professional development that promotes sustained growth for themselves, their students, and for VCS's academic programs as a whole.

SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS

We integrate biblical truths into every subject area. Daily, our students are taught a biblical world-view with the Bible being the authority on morality. All students have daily Bible classes, weekly chapels, weekly small-group discussions led by teachers, and clubs with biblical themes which supplement the Christian growth experience. Our team leads us in worship during chapel, while special speakers, teachers and pastors bring messages that emphasize our yearly chapel theme.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

VCES offers a complete and excellent range of academics designed to prepare students to excel in Middle and High School. All teachers offer tutoring during the week to assist students or to answer questions. And we use PowerSchool, an online program that helps parents monitor their student's course work, grades, and attendance. Pull-out classes include Library, PE, Art, Vocal Music, Band, and Computers. Resource classes are available through an on-site independent contractor for students needing extra help in reading. GATE classes, are available for eligible students as an after school program, in 3rd -5th grades.

TECHNOLOGY

Technology is strongly emphasized at VCES. Each classroom is equipped with a SMART Board. Students in K-3rd grade attend computer class weekly, for one semester. Students in 4th & 5th grades attend computer class for the full year. The Elementary library is equipped with computers for AR testing.

EXTENDED CARE

Extended Care is available both before and after school. To register for Extended Care, sign up through Admissions or complete a File Maintenance form in the elementary office.

ENRICHMENT CLASSES

VCS Elementary students can participate in a variety of Enrichment classes, including Chess, Culinary Arts, Spanish, Lego/Robotics, Painting, Drawing, and Gardening. Offerings will vary by session, and details are available in the Elementary office, and Newsletter.

K – 12TH GRADE**

(including transitional kindergarten)

1. Requirements for K-12 admission also apply to transfer pupils.
2. Combination vaccines (e.g., MMRV) meet the requirements for individual component vaccines. Doses of DTP count towards the DTaP requirement.
3. Any vaccine administered four or fewer days prior to the minimum required age is valid.
4. Three doses of polio vaccine meet the requirement if one dose was given on or after the 4th birthday.
5. Four doses of DTaP meet the requirement if at least one dose was given on or after the 4th birthday. Three doses meet the requirement if at least one dose of Tdap, DTaP, or DTP vaccine was given on or after the 7th birthday (also meets the 7th-12th grade Tdap requirement. See fn. 8.)

1. One or two doses of Td vaccine given on or after the 7th birthday count towards the K-12 requirement.
2. For 7th grade admission, refer to Health and Safety Code section 120335, subdivision (c).
3. Two doses of measles, two doses of mumps, and one dose of rubella vaccine meet the requirement, separately or combined. Only doses administered on or after the 1st birthday meet the requirement.
4. For 7th-12th graders, at least one dose of pertussis-containing vaccine is required on or after the 7th birthday.
5. For children in ungraded schools, pupils 12 years and older are subject to the 7th grade advancement requirements.
6. The varicella requirement for seventh grade advancement expires after June 30, 2025.

DTaP/Tdap = diphtheria toxoid, tetanus toxoid, and acellular pertussis vaccine

Hep B = hepatitis B vaccine

MMR = measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine

Varicella = chickenpox vaccine

INSTRUCTIONS:

California schools are required to check immunization records for all new student admissions at TK /Kindergarten through 12th grade and all students advancing to 7th grade before entry. Students entering 7th grade who had a personal beliefs exemption on file must meet the requirements for TK/K-12 and 7th grade. See shotsforschool.org for more information.

UNCONDITIONALLY ADMIT a pupil whose parent or guardian has provided documentation of any of the following for each immunization required for the pupil's age or grade as defined in table above:

- Receipt of immunization.
- A permanent medical exemption.*
- A personal beliefs exemption (filed in CA prior to 2016); this is valid until enrollment in the next grade span, typically at TK/K or 7th grade.[†]

CONDITIONALLY ADMIT any pupil who lacks documentation for unconditional admission if the pupil has:

- Commenced receiving doses of all the vaccines required for the pupil's grade (table above) and is not currently due for any doses at the time of admission (as determined by intervals listed in Conditional Admission Schedule, column entitled "EXCLUDE IF NOT GIVEN BY"), or
- A temporary medical exemption from some or all required immunizations.*

CONDITIONAL ADMISSION SCHEDULE FOR GRADES K-12

Before admission a child must obtain the first dose of each required vaccine and any subsequent doses that are due because the period of time allowed before exclusion has elapsed.

Hep B #2	4 weeks after 1st dose	8 weeks after 1st dose
Hep B #3	8 weeks after 2nd dose and at least 4 months after 1st dose	12 months after 2nd dose
MMR #2	4 weeks after 1st dose	4 months after 1st dose
Varicella #2	Age less than 13 years: 3 months after 1st dose	4 months after 1st dose
	Age 13 years and older: 4 weeks after 1st dose	8 weeks after 1st dose

- Three doses of polio vaccine meet the requirement if one dose was given on or after the fourth birthday. If polio #3 is the final required dose, polio #3 should be given at least six months after polio #2.
- If DTaP #3 is the final required dose, DTaP #3 should be given at least six months after DTaP #2, and pupils should be excluded if not given by 12 months after second dose. Three doses meet the requirement if at least one dose of Tdap, DTaP, or DTP vaccine was given on or after the seventh birthday. One or two doses of Td vaccine given on or after the seventh birthday count towards the requirement.

Continued attendance after conditional admission is contingent upon documentation of receipt of the remaining required immunizations. The school shall:

- review records of any pupil admitted conditionally to a school at least every 30 days from the date of admission,
- inform the parent or guardian of the remaining required vaccine doses until all required immunizations are received or an exemption is filed, and
- update the immunization information in the pupil's record.

For a pupil **transferring** from another school in the United States whose immunization record has not been received by the new school at the time of admission, the school may admit the child for up to 30 school days. If the immunization record has not been received at the end of this period, the school shall exclude the pupil until the parent or guardian provides documentation of compliance with the requirements.

Once you become a BASIC Fund family and continue to meet the eligibility guidelines, scholarships are renewable annually through your child's 8th grade year. All siblings can be included for consideration if desired. Scholarships are awarded on a first-come first-served basis.
